Recently I was asked whether freedom of speech is defended/guaranteed in the Bible. Freedom of Speech of course is a right protected in the U.S. Constitution, and with all rights, it is based upon the "inalienable rights" granted to human beings by their Creator (i.e., God). It is important to note, however, that this list of inalienable rights doesn't necessarily come from the Bible. After all, many of the formulators of our nation's constitution were Deists. They didn't believe in the God revealed to us in the Bible – a God who is directly involved in the ongoing story and lives of His creation out of love for them. They believed in a divine watchmaker, a God who set everything in order, and then stepped away from the picture after setting everything in motion. For Deists, a God who interacts with humanity through acts of divine revelation (such as God does at Mount Sinai, the Transfiguration, and the Resurrection of Jesus) is nothing more than a myth. Instead, many Deists, including some of the founding fathers, believed that God the Creator could only reveal Himself through the Law He had written upon the human heart "in the beginning."

As Christians who recognize that God has directly revealed Himself through events such as the giving of the Law on Mount Sinai, the Transfiguration of our Lord, and His miraculous rising from the dead, we must reject this image of a divine watchmaker. Yes, God did create all things, but He continues to sustain this creation and be directly involved in it. Because their concept of revelation was so different

JESUS AND THE WOMAN TAKEN IN ADULTERY

Jesus stooped down, and with his finger wrote on the ground ... and said unto them,

He that is without sin among you, let him first case a stone at her. ... (John &c. 7)

from what we as Christians know revelation to be, we should expect for their conclusions about what constitutes an "inalienable right" to be different from our own. How do we know what our inalienable rights are as creatures? We know them from the Bible, the Word of our Creator which directly tells us who we are, how we should live, and what His purpose for our lives is. On that note, the question of whether or not freedom of speech is a God-given right is still a difficult one.

Certainly, God does not compel human beings to say anything. We certainly have the freedom to say whatever we desire. Nonetheless, because we have the freedom to do something does not mean that it is always right to do anything. God has given us His Law – how we should live god-pleasing lives – to tell us what we should and shouldn't do. As Christians, those who have been forgiven their sins in Christ Jesus and set free from the condemnation of the Law for our sins, we are now lords of this Law. The Law does not determine our relationship with God. We are solely

righteous because of Christ Jesus and His fulfillment of the Law. As Luther says, we are lords of everything. Yet, at the same time, since we have been redeemed by the Crucified One, we also have a different concept of freedom than that of the world. We are set free to serve our neighbor. So, while we are lords of everything through Christ Jesus, we are also servants of everyone.

For this reason, we live lives in accordance with the Law because the Law reveals how we might serve our neighbor. The Law shapes the way we should speak. We shouldn't talk negatively about our neighbors behind their backs (Proverbs 24:28-29), we should speak kindly and compassionately towards one another (Ephesians 4:23), we should seek to defend and build up our neighbor's good reputation because good reputations are a gift from God (Ecclesiastes 7:1), and we should always be willing and quick to offer a word of forgiveness when our neighbor sins against us (Colossians 3:13). Is freedom of speech an inalienable right given to us by our Creator? Yes and no. We have been set free from sin, condemnation, and the Devil by Christ Jesus. This freedom, however, takes the form of service for our neighbor. "If any would be first, he must be last of all and servant of all." (Mark 9:35) Therefore, whatever we say and do as Christians is done freely out of service for our neighbor. In summary, just because you can say something doesn't mean that you should say something. Before speaking we should ask ourselves: Is what I'm about to say true? If so, is what I'm about to say necessary? And if so, how can I say it in a kind way that builds up my neighbor? Maybe we'll all become a bit quieter when we ask ourselves these questions. At the same time, we should become more loquacious for the sake of our neighbors like the civil rights activists did all those years ago. Happy Epiphany and a blessed Martin Luther King Jr. Day.



The Loaves & Fishes Free Community Meal celebrated its 16th Anniversary on November 20, 2024. Using a turkey donated by the Flynns and cooked by Diane Lottig, 8 turkey and stuffing casseroles were baked for our diners. Also on the menu were sweet potatoes, broccoli, and Pat South's homemade cranberry relish. The meal was enjoyed by 40 people. The cost of the food was \$177 which includes many frozen pies. Homemade desserts were donated that night so we will use the pies at another meal. The donation box received \$151.00.

Workers for the meal were Pat South, Joanne Quesenberry, Barb Goodell, Fran Buxton, Shirley Bellar, Melanie Seal, Linda Hobson, Brian and Diane Lottig, and Earl Evans. Melanie is new to the group, having joined us in January. We admire her youth, energy, cooking skills, and her willingness to tackle any job. Once we called her "Cinderella" because she volunteered to clean a dirty oven! Earl has been a reliable worked who does dish drying after eating his meal. Ruth Martzowka was also a new worker in January. She gladly responded to a plea to help when 4 of our regular helpers were absent. We are thankful for Earl, Ruth, and Melanie and all our monthly helpers.

All our dessert people are equally appreciated. Fred Myers, Shirleys brother, was a new dessert contributor this year. Farmer member Kathie Havener has also continued her dessert ministry. Tracy Stamm, Linda Hobson, Sue Haydu, Kat Flynn, and Melanie have also added greatly to our dessert menu.

We continue to thank others who have made our meals less costly. Maureen Ballentine's corn is always good. Beef from the Goodell family reduces our costs as well as the hams and turkey donated by the Flynn family. We also had bags of rolls donated from a recent meal. The 4 C's continues to bring leftover desserts and breads received from Heinen's to share with our diners. Earl has also helped others by donating groceries. Those not taken are given to the 4 C's.

Figures for each meal are recorded by Pat. Our average attendance this year was 46; average meal cost was \$111; average donations were \$104.00. A surprise donation of \$70 was received in Diane's mail in July from the daughter of a charter member. While shopping for the June meal, Diane and Pat chatted with this woman in the Wal-Mart checkout line.

To make extra money, The Loaves & Fishes group participated in the Fall Fest. Cookies were baked for a donation from those wanting them. We took in \$177 and after expenses were deducted, we made \$106.44. This was our first fundraiser.

Please note that Loaves & Fishes is a separate ministry not run by the Women's Guild. We deal with cash and exist by donations. The group did receive a 10% tithe from the Guild's Rummage Sale - \$117 – and the group can request money set aside in the church budget if needed.

By God's grace we've been happy to sponsor this monthly meal for 16 years and hopefully for many more to come.
